Joe as a member of Orange Belt Field Archers (OBFA) became Vice-President 1982-1983 and President 1984-1990: 1994-present. Was awarded Life Membership in 1993. During Joe's tenure as President of OBFA: the region hosted the 1987, 1993, 2001, 2007 CBH-SAA State Meeting and Big Game Club banquet. He also helped run archery shooting booths at Long Beach and Pomona Fair Grounds and at Mike Raughey's Shooting Fairs.

He was elected CBH-SAA President in 1990. During his Presidency he accomplished updating of the CBH-SAA logo, oversaw the production of the CBH-SAA 50th Anniversary history book and designed the 50th Anniversary commemorative belt buckle, designed a new CBH-SAA poster and developed the CBH-SAA "Hit" tag.

Charley's passion for archery started at the age of 8 hunting small game in Wyoming, inspired by movies of Robin Hood, Fred Bear and Howard Hill. On moving to California at age 15, his interest turned to big game hunting. He has hunted both small and big game with the bow and has successfully taken several species of game including deer and tule elk.

He has been a member of Yahi, Flintstone and Maya Archers. In 1980, at the invitation of the President of the Nevada County Sportsmen Club, he became a member and helped begin an archery program for the club. He is a life member and has served as Archery Director, President, Secretary, and National Rifle Association Representative.

He is a certified 4H archery and rifle instructor, certified NFAA Instructor and a level 4 NFAA Coach (through training at the US Olympic Training Center in Chula Vista) as well as being a IBEP Bow Hunter Education Instructor.

He has won over fifty State, NFAA Sectional, NFAA National and IFAA World championships and currently holds six state records, five national records and one world record.

In 2003, he found his real passion, when he became a Junior Olympic Archery Development coach and became head coach of the Nevada County Gold JOAD Archery Team. The eleven member team in 2005 and 2006 established a record of 34 state championships, twenty-six state records, seven national championships and four national records in the intermediate and advanced levels of Olympic and FITA style.

In 2005, five of the team members ranged in the top three in their competitive categories in the State Archers of California and two ranked number 1. In 2006, two of the team were ranked number 1 in their categories in SAC. During 2005, he coached 15 year old Trelaina Borges to four national championships and to the number two ranked Jr. United States Archery Team Women's Cadet in the United States. In 2006, he coached 15 year old Gemma Goepel to the eight ranked Jr. USAT Women's Cadet in the United States and number seven ranked Women's Cadet in the World Team Trials. He is still coaching and it is a sure bet that his students will continue to place high in the rankings.

Charley has stated that coaching these young men and women has been one of the most rewarding things that he has ever done. His present goal is to coach one of his students in the 2008 Olympic Trials.

He also stated that the greatest inspiration of his life was his late wife of 45 years, Linnie Sue Washburn, who understood his passion for archery.

Ginger McClintock was born on September 18, 1942 and grew up in Santa Rosa. She was fascinated by husband Rich's bows, and one Sunday in 1973, she decided to tag along to a shoot in Discovery Park, Sacramento. After deciding that she "could do that", Rich bought her a 35 lb Root stick bow. Her first compound was a Jennings. She next shot a beautiful Carroll and was offered a contract shooting for them. She also shot for Martin for a while, and then Bear. She traveled with the Jim and Gwen Carroll to Japan to demonstrate Carroll bows.

Rich was her mentor and she felt he was more knowledgeable in setting up equipment and she believes her trust in his ability gave her confidence when attending a tournament, whether local, state or national.

She was a member of Sonoma County Bowmen and served one term as Secretary. Ginger has shot recurve and compound bows in Free Style Limited and Free Style Unlimited. She competed in Amateur and Pro Divisions.

In 1973 she won the State Target Tournament in AA class.

1974 State Field in Pro FS and National Tournament in Pro FS.

Won in Las Vegas in 1977.

In 1984 was top shooter FSL in State Field and State Broadhead Tournaments.

In 1985 won State Indoor FSL and in 1986 won both the State Indoor and State Field Tournaments FS, and also placed top in Atlantic City Tournament.

In 1987 was State Field Champion in Pro FSL.

Ginger shot competitively against Faye Binney and Liz Colombo, and as she said "we had a terrific group of women shooting when I started and I admired each and every one of them."

Ginger was right. And she was one of those terrific archers. Her record of winning tournaments and her friendship with her competitors testifies to that.
